Happy 90th Birthday NIFA!

This year marks the 90th anniversary of NIFA flight competitions. NIFA has evolved over the years, but its beginnings were impressive too. The organization was established in 1919, with the intent to start flying clubs at every university in the country. The first meeting of the Intercollegiate Flying Association was then held in 1920, at Mitchell Field, in Mineola, NY. The airplanes, of course, were different, and so were the competing schools. Competitors came from Harvard, Yale, Princeton, and Rutgers, among others. The five events were, maneuvering and aerobatics, “takeoffs and landings to mark,” alert competition, altitude test, and a 100 mile cross country race.



There were some well-known names involved too. Treasurer Juan Trippe would go on to found Pan American World Airways, and the executive committee was composed of military officers. There is no record of the competitors, but considering their education, and that flying was still reserved for the wealthy, we can only guess what their futures held.

The future of aviation is always difficult to predict, but looking at how we started, and how much aviation has grown, there’s no telling where NIFA will go from here!

Terre Haute Makes the Movies

A Christmas Story takes place in Hammond, IN, hometown of, Jean Shepherd, author of the books the movie was based on. Terre Haute is about 150 miles south of Hammond.



Frank Sinatra's movie *Some Came Running* refers to Terre Haute several times. After Frank Sinatra's (Dave Hirsh) and Shirley MacLaine's (Ginnie Moorehead) characters are engaged Ginnie asks

"Dave, can we please go to Terre Haute for our honeymoon?"

The satiric newspaper *The Onion* published an article on the local music scene in 2001 titled "Garage

Band Actually Believes there is a 'Terre Haute Sound.'"

Terre Haute was the target of the dastardly plot by Nazi stooges in the 1982 spoof movie *Dead Men Don't Wear Plaid*. Terre Haute's "role" in the movie was the contribution of actor/comedian Steve Martin, star and co-writer of *Dead Men Don't Wear Plaid*. Martin visited Terre Haute and performed his stand-up routine a few years prior to making the movie.

Today in Aviation: May 20

- In 1784... The first women to ascend in a tethered balloon are the Marchioness de Montalembert, the Contess de Montalenbert, the Contess de Podenas, and Mademoiselle de Ligarde. Their Montgolfier balloon lifts to the length of the restraining rope.

- In 1927... The first solo non-stop flight across the Atlantic is made by Charles A. Lindbergh. In his Ryan mono plane Spirit of St. Louis, he covers 3,600 miles in 33 hours, 29 minutes and wins the Orteig Prize of \$25,000.



- In 1929... Charles Lindbergh marries Anne, daughter of Dwight W. Morrow, U.S. Ambassador to Mexico and author of an influential report on American aviation.



- In 1932... The first solo flight by a woman pilot across the Atlantic is made by American Amelia Earhart. She flies from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland to Londonderry, Northern Ireland in a Lockheed Vega mono plane in 13 hours, 30 minutes.
