Wings of Eagles School of Flight is a full service, free standing, independent flight school, which was established in 2000. It was originally founded by a group of pilots who had a desire to give back to the next generation of pilots, in honor of all those who had helped them during their training. It later became part of Corporate

us to use for the competition. In addition to Part 61 and 141 instruction for private, instrument, commercial, CFI, CFII, and ASEL ATP, they also offer a Jetstream 4100 type rating course and a high altitude course utilizing the simulator.

Wings of Eagles is also a Cirrus Standardized Training Center, and is soon to have the same status with Diamond Aircraft. Plans are also in progress to begin an international flight training contract, to conduct flight training with Chinese students from zero flight time through multi-engine commercial certification over an eight month span, as well as becoming a CATS testing center. Other assets and programs include a referral contract with Helistar in Nashville to provide rotorwing training, and a partnership with the Vanderbilt ROTC program to provide the first 25 hours of flight training.

In addition to providing the simulator for the CRM event and the Diamond Katana used in preflight, they also stand ready to supply any needs you may have. Their stock includes Sporty's, King, ASA, and David Clark products.

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NIFA Spotlight: Dominic Landolphi

This year makes 23 consecutive years for Dominic as the Staging Judge for nationals.

He says he'll be coming back as long as he's having fun, and enjoys the students, after all, age is only a state of mind!

Dominic was a B-47 Stratojet Crew Chief in the Strategic Air Command at Dyess Air Force Base in Texas in the late '50's. After leaving the Air Force, he married his high school sweetheart, and they now have 4 daughters. He decided he wanted to be a meteorologist, so he went to Cal State University in Los Angeles, graduating in '72. From there he went on to graduate school at UCLA. In the end though, he has operated an Allstate insurance agency for the past 35 years in Diamond Bar, California.

Because of his age, he decided to get involved in aviation on the general aviation side, instead of making a career of it. He holds all his ratings up through commercial, instrument, and multi-engine, and does most of his flying with the Civil Air Patrol. In addition to being a Lieutenant Colonel for the search and rescue squadron, he is the homeland security officer for the southern California area, where he works with Homeland Security Officials. As part of search and rescue, he was also part of the search efforts for Steve Fossett. Most of the time he flies either a Cessna 206 or 182.

He first became involved with NIFA when he started competing with the community college where he earned his instrument rating. He helped get their team more organized and structured, and they began having their first formal practices and try-outs because of his involvement. He competed in the early '80's, and because the team was fairly small, he was in practically every single event. He enjoyed it so much that he decided to stay involved after his competition years were over. He also went on to pursue a couple degrees in aviation and flight just to "fill in the blanks."

His advice to all the competitors this week is this: "Enjoy what you're doing, be a team player, and plan ahead in what you do in life."
